World Book Day 2025 took place on Thursday 6 March 2025.



- all while strengthening communication and emotional skills










PE at 1066

The Ordinary Climbers


As part of PE Key stage 3, we have started a new sports lesson this term of rock climbing for one half term and 1066 the other, split between the classes.

Grand Opening of our hairdressing salon



Bowling Maths Trip

GSH group took a trip to tenpin bowling to support some learning they had been doing in Maths. The children most recently had been looking at averages as well as area and circumference of circles.

After the bowling the children looked at their scores and was able to work out their range, mean, median and mode of their scores. This experience allowed the children to appreciate how averages could be used in a real-life scenario.

The children were also able to consider how they would work out the area of a bowling ball. The children talked about what formula they could use, $4\pi r^2$ would work as that would calculate the surface area of a sphere. The children could identify that a bowling ball is the same shape as a sphere.









Herstmonceux Science Centre

The children in KS3 visited the Science Centre to learn how they use their huge telescopes to see into far away galaxies. They all had an amazing time and really enjoyed playing on the interactive science equipment.

We are all sad to learn that the Science Centre will be relocating soon.











Build a Bike

On Thursday 20Th March three children completed the first of three Build-a-Bike sessions.

They had an amazing day, used active listening skills, really taking on board what the instructors Steve and Paul were showing and telling them. The children learnt how to build a bicycle from scratch. The children started with just their frame. After unwrapping and attaching the frame to the stand they added the wheels.

The children added their brakes: front and back, the gears and the pedals, the last part to add was the chain and checking it was on tight enough to work well with the gear changes.

All three children worked so well and used an assortment of tools correctly and were so proud of the hard work they achieved. Children even enjoyed a chance to ride their bicylces once they were finished.



Children were allows to take the bicycles home, they were provided helmets, bicycle locks and lights.

Also children were successful in securing four AQA unit awards – watch this space for certificates.


Year 11 Geography Field Trip

'I liked the jokes, they were really fun.'










GCSE Physics

Parents, foster parents and professionals enjoyed the afternoon including the wonderful buffet.


