Scrumptious School Lunches!

At their first school council meeting of the year, children met with Mrs Rumball, our new lunch manager, to discuss healthy eating and school meals. Children shared ideas on how they felt we could improve our school lunches.



Thoughtful and realistic suggestions on healthy food were made by the children and so it was possible for Mrs Rumball to action their requests and revamp our school lunch menu.

Alongside the usual sandwiches, we now offer children wraps with a greater range of fillings, pasta, pizza, plus additional fruit and vegetables, including peppers, tomatoes and carrot sticks. The 'try something new' option on the menu has given the children a chance to sample pomegranate, watermelon and green 'hulk' pasta – mac and cheese with hidden spinach. These additions have been very popular, and it has been rewarding to see children have the confidence to try foods they may not usually eat.

Baton of Hope

At the beginning of September, the whole school took part in a creative community project to promote positive mental health and kindness in support of the charity, Kent and Medway Baton of Hope. Children painted colourful stones with uplifting words and designs with the intention of sharing these quiet messages of



support along our local beach. Each stone carried a personal message of encouragement and positivity.



The stones were then placed along Whitstable's beaches for people to find, keep, or pass on, helping to spread the message of hope and remind others that support is always available.

This heartwarming project encouraged pupils to reflect on empathy, wellbeing, and the power of small acts of kindness. The project was one we were glad to be part of, showing how creativity and compassion can bring people together.

Neptune Class News

A big welcome to all our new children in Neptune Class.

Why did Santa go to music school?

To improve his wrapping skills!



This term, Neptune Class have been busy exploring a wide range of exciting topics. We began with the Stone Age and discovered how early humans survived, where they lived, what they wore, and how they created tools. The children made their own Stone Age jewellery using salt dough and experimented with recreating cave paintings.

In Maths, we have partitioned, added and subtracted numbers up to 10,000. We explored mixed numbers by recognising whole and fractional parts and placing them accurately on a number line. The children also practised their multiplication using arrays,

grouping and sharing to find multiples of 2, 5, 10 and 3, and we have been learning to identify different types of triangles and quadrilaterals.



In Science, we have investigated friction and magnets, testing how a toy car moved on different surfaces to find out which created the least friction. This half-term, our focus has shifted to the human body and how to care for our teeth. We carried out an investigation using eggs placed in orange juice, water, cola and milk to see how sugary drinks can affect tooth enamel. The class predicted that orange juice would have the biggest effect... and they were right!

In English, we have enjoyed reading the poetry of Michael Rosen, exploring rhyming words and writing poems of our own. We also learned how to write clear instructions using bossy verbs and followed a set of instructions to bake gingerbread cookies.



Next term, we are looking forward to learning alternative versions of traditional stories, telling the time, learning all about mountains and light. We are looking forward to an exciting term ahead, filled with great fun and learning.

Neptune class has been joined by two brilliant new members of staff. Whilst Miss Blake is on maternity leave, Miss Tritton will be covering as class Progress Engagement Guide. She brings to the class lots of experience of working with young children in various environments. Ms Pugh will be working as a 1:1 Progress Engagement Guide, she is highly experienced in working with children with a range of additional needs. Her fabulous and joyful personality has brought fun and laughter to the classroom. She has a special ability to raise a smile from all the children even at more challenging moments. Both Ms Pugh and Miss Tritton are welcome additions to the Neptune Class team.

Atlantis Class have had a great start to the year!



This term, in our Topic lessons, we have learnt about the Stone Age. Children enjoyed making Stonehenge from biscuits - I think they enjoyed eating the biscuits too! We also looked at the Great Fire of London and how firefighting equipment has changed over the last 400 years. More recently, we have traced Ernest Shackleton's journey to Antarctica on the Endurance and thought about how it would feel if we were travelling for nearly 3 years to somewhere freezing cold!

In Maths, we have worked on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills; children created pictures with shapes, including Christmas decorations. Maths lessons have been a lot of fun! In Science, we've

learnt how our bodies change as we grow, and looked at how different forces act on objects - we tested the effect of friction by racing toy cars down the corridor and through the classroom to see what effect the floor had on their distance. We made paper parachutes and dropped them from the fire escape stairs to see how air resistance slows falling objects.





In addition to all this amazing learning, we have made new friendships, played about fifty thousand games of snakes and ladders, laughed lots and bonded as a class.

We would also like to extend a warm welcome to Mrs Bangar who is working in Atlantis class this term.

Next term, we're going to be looking at fantasy stories and African folk tales in English. Mountains and Mayans in Topic, light and evolution in Science and revisiting fractions, multiplication and division and looking at measurements in Maths. There will be lots of learning and lots of fun!

Our Friday swimming sessions are a highlight of the week for children across all year groups. The lessons are led by qualified instructors at Whitstable Pools with a focus on water safety and developing strong swimming techniques.

The lessons are great fun and staff have been impressed by the progress children have made since the start of term. The growth in both confidence and independence in the children has been a notable joy to watch.

At the end of this term each child received a certificate in recognition of their swimming achievements. We are especially pleased to congratulate the children who achieved their Level 2 and 3 badges. What an outstanding achievement. Well done to you all!

On the 11th of November, the children at ISP School Whitstable took part in a Remembrance Day with Wreath-Laying Ceremony.

Children respectfully paid tribute to local heroes this by creating poppy wreaths and placing them on the town's war memorial. The touching ceremony, led by Mrs Forman, encouraged pupils to reflect on the bravery and sacrifices made by those who served in past conflicts. Children in Poseidon class also wrote thoughtful poems.





All of the children worked hard to design their own wreaths using poppies, messages of gratitude, and symbols of peace. The children then gathered at the Whitstable memorial, where they observed a respectful silence before laying their creations.
